Blinn College Expands to Rapidly Growing West Bryan

Blinn College is expanding in the rapidly growing area of the west side of Bryan with the purchase of 94 acres of land. The location has convenient access to several major roadways: FM 2818, Villa Maria, State Highway 47, Leonard Road, State Highway 21 and Raymond Stotzer Parkway, and is near the biocorridor, Health Science Center campus and Texas A&M University Campus.

"The location of the new campus on the west side of Bryan is an excellent location for the new campus," said Bryan Mayor Jason Bienski. "The City of Bryan has been proud to be home to the Blinn College in Brazos County since 1970, and we are proud of our 1997 partnership that facilitated the construction of the current Blinn campus at the corner of Villa Maria and East 29th in Bryan."

Blinn's success and economic impact on the community are unparalleled in terms of community colleges across the country. And, Blinn is a tremendous resource locally for providing a trained and educated workforce. The City anticipates increased retail and residential development and activity on the west side with the advent of this new campus.

"I would like to acknowledge the foresight of former City Councils who had the vision to invest in the west side of Bryan, an investment that has paid off with unprecedented growth through the biocorridor, Health Science Center, Traditions, the Atlas master-planned development, numerous other residential developments, the new Walmart shopping center, improved and expanded infrastructure, and now the new Blinn College campus – the future home of 10,000 to 15,000 students who will not only learn in Bryan, but will shop, live, and otherwise invest in the local economy," Bienski said.

Building Boom of Restaurants, Retail, Residential Rooftops in Bryan

From KBTX: A business boom is happening in Bryan. Commercial construction doubled over the past year. News 3 takes a look at the numbers and how commercial construction is on an upswing.

"Residential and commercial has just been flourishing. Our numbers are way up in '13 just for residential homes. I think we did 180 homes in 14 we did 233 homes," said Cody Cravatt, who is Bryan's Development Manager.

"I mean the Axis Pipe and Tube came in that brought a lot of jobs this direction you know and that tends to lead right in to the residential," he said.

Cravatt says there are plans for five new hotels including a Super 8. "It's just a happy time to be in Bryan," he said.

Last year the City of Bryan had nearly \$135 million worth of building projects.

The City of Bryan will coordinate with Blinn and other property owners to develop a Master Plan for the immediately surrounding area to ensure development that is compatible and conducive to an educational facility. There are very few single-family homes that are in close proximity to this property.

The City will expedite the permitting process and work with Blinn to ensure that infrastructure availability is adequate to the first phase of the project.

"Bryan is proud to be home now to not one, but two Blinn College campuses, and we are proud of our partnership with Blinn College," Bienski said. "After all, Blinn is Better in Bryan!"

Plans for New Health and Wellness Area in Bryan Revealed

From KBTX: Officials with St. Joseph Regional Health Center and the City of Bryan have been talking about ways to breathe new life into the area near the hospital and Blinn College.

Looney Ricks Kiss, an architecture and planning firm based in Memphis, has led the planning team working with the city, St. Joseph, task force members and community stakeholders to develop the Health and Wellness Area Plan.

The plan will focus on creating opportunities to design a health and wellness district with community design concepts which promote healthy, active lifestyles in order to create an innovative Health and Wellness Area Plan whose character resonates with and supports world-class employers and employees in our area.

Animal Center Receives High Marks from Department of State Health Services

The Department of State Health Services (DSHS) arrived unannounced to the Bryan Animal Center to conduct the annual State inspection. The Bryan Animal Center received high marks given by the agency. The DSHS rates facilities as Satisfactory, Unsatisfactory or Probation, with Bryan Animal Center receiving the Satisfactory rating.

In comments from the inspector, it was noted that the "shelter staff are dedicated and passionate about maintaining the facility and caring for the animals." The comments wrapped up by saying that the "Bryan Animal Shelter [sic] is an asset to the community and a model facility in region 7. Great Job!"

This isn't the first year that the Center has received high marks. The City of Bryan took over operations in September 2011, since then, each State and annual vet inspection has led to high ratings.

"We keep the building in good order, physically. We are diligent with upkeep and repairs, we thoroughly clean and disinfect daily," Julianne Burkhalter, Animal Center Supervisor said. "We have strict procedures to ensure that it stays clean."The Bryan Animal Center staff has a thorough cleaning process, the building is well maintained, and is sanitary. All animals are fed and watered and housed in accordance with regulations and chemicals are stored properly.

"I'm very proud of my staff, and extremely proud of the comments they received" Burkhalter said. "The inspectors have been complimentary to the staff saying that we are welcoming, pleasant and always happy to show them around. We were also told we are an example facility and they show pictures of our facility to others in the state for training."

"The animal center takes in about 3,000 animals per year, which means our staff care for 150-180 animals daily," Hugh Walker, Deputy City Manager said. "They are dedicated not only to helping to find the animals forever homes, but to ensuring they run the best animal center around. We are extremely proud of all the work Julianne and the Bryan Animal Center staff does daily."

Recently, the City of Bryan released a special report on the Animal Center to showcase the work that goes into the center to get animals reunited with their families or adopted by new ones.

National Employee Appreciation Day

From KAGS: When you work hard, it's nice to be appreciated. Today is a day just for that. It's national Employee Appreciation Day and one local animal shelter's staff's deserves to be rewarded. The Bryan animal shelter and its employees received high remarks from a state inspection.

It's not all about the furry faces and glamour.

"It's dealing with all the dirty poopy stuff," says Mika Smith, the lead animal control officer at the Bryan Animal Shelter.

And the heartbreak.

"Every animal that comes in we want them to get good homes so



when we do have a dog or cat come in and they are here longer than anything else, those are the ones we try to spend a little more time with," says Smith.

Mika Smith has worked at the animal shelter

for eight years and says she wouldn't trade it for anything.

"It's very rewarding when we get them out to a permanent home or a rescue," says Smith.

When the inspector comes here unannounced, he looks at everything- the animals, the facility, and especially the staff.

"Each individual that comes out that works here at the City of Bryan or even volunteers. They really have a passion for the animals and that was really shown with the marks that we got to the state health department," says Eric Zaragoza, the environmental services manager in Bryan.

The health department stated that the staff at the Bryan Animal Shelter are dedicated and passionate about maintaining the facility and caring for the animals.

"They like coming in because they like the animals and they also like coming in knowing that they are changing someone's life for the better. Employees and our volunteers work very hard without the employees and without the volunteers we wouldn't be able to go what we do every day," says Smith.

Bryan Municipal Court Shines "In The Spotlight"

Bryan Municipal Court is the first court to grace the Texas Municipal Court Association's "In the Spotlight" feature. The new feature on the TMCA website will highlight a different municipal court each month.



The Bryan Municipal Court is responsible for adjudication of all Class C misdemeanors which is inclusive of Traffic, Penal, Education, Alcohol and Beverage Codes as well as City Ordinances. The Court processes an average of about 20,000 cases a year and issues an average of about 5,500 warrants.

The City of Bryan has been at the court technology forefront with installing. Credit Card payments have been accepted at the counters since 1989, and online credit card payments since 1998. Video arraignment was installed in 1997, making the Bryan Municipal Court the first court in Brazos County to have this technology. In July of 2008, the municipal court moved into a new facility that increased protection and improved accessibility by means of all employees having proximity cards for entry to the building.

The court building has holding cells for the City Marshals to use if necessary. Recently, docket posting monitors, a payment kiosk and a security screening system have been installed to increase the quality of service and ensure the safety of everyone that enters the court.

In 2012, the Bryan Municipal Court became a court of record. The court staff consists of four Attorney Judges, one Court Administrator, one Deputy Court Administrator, four City Marshals, a Warrant Technician, Juvenile Case Manager, Community Service Coordinator, and seven clerks. Of the staff members, eight are Level II and two are Level I certified court clerks.

The Bryan Municipal court is a three-time awardee of the Traffic Safety Initiative Award, hosted by the Texas Municipal Court Education Center. The dedicated staff members are proud to increase their roles each year in making the Bryan community a safer place in which to live and travel.

Bryan Launches 'The Cost of DWI: The Flipside' to Warn Against Drinking and Driving this Spring Break

In an effort to raise awareness about the hazards of drinking and driving, especially during Spring Break, the City of Bryan has launched the second installment of its drinking and driving campaign. "The Cost of DWI: The Flipside" tells stories from individuals who were arrested for DWI and the ripple effects afterward.

Part One of this special report was released last year and focused on the victims of DWI accidents.

The City wants to educate local residents about the consequences and tragedies that can result from drinking and driving, and prevent these types of accidents from occurring.

"We want to remind people that driving while intoxicated on Texas roads will not be tolerated," said Kelley McKethan, Bryan Police Public Information Officer. "We want everyone to be able to enjoy a safe Spring Break. If you choose to drink, then do not drive. Find another way home, or your local police will find you a ride to jail."

The Texas Fire Chiefs Association's annual awards program recognizes members of the fire service for improving the lives and fire safety of Texas citizens. Awards are given for service, innovation, and heroism.



The Bryan Fire Department was honored with the Safety Impact Award, which honors departments for implementing an innovative and progressive program that enhances their community's fire and life safety service delivery.

"We are honored to have Chief McGregor and Bryan Fire Department recognized for these efforts," said Terry Barnett, Assistant Chief of Operations. "As a department, we have made

changes operationally to help improve our overall operations and safety on the fire ground since the tragic Knights of Columbus Hall fire. These efforts have been acknowledged by the State Fire Marshal's office as well as other Fire Chiefs throughout the state of Texas."

Chief McGregor was unanimously selected to be the recipient of the 2014 Fire Chief of the Year Award. The Fire Chief of the Year Award is TFCA's highest honor for service. This award recognizes fire chiefs who are dedicated to life safety issues and to the Texas Fire Service; and have completed significant achievements or accomplishments during the previous year for their department through their leadership and vision.

"Chief McGregor is an incredible asset to the City of Bryan," Kean Register, Bryan City Manager said. "We've always known what an outstanding fire chief he is, and now it's nice to know that others recognize this as well. We are very honored that both he and our fire department have been acknowledged by this outstanding organization."

Texas Reds Steak and Grape Festival... Brings Back the Steaks

From KBTX - Organizers with the Downtown Bryan Association say this year's Texas Reds Steak and Grape Festival will actually include...steaks.

After being removed from last year's menu, the DBA decided to bring back steak dinners after reviewing visitor feedback.

Less than 10,000 people attended the free, two-day festival and organizers hope to surpass that number this year.

Texas Reds had an economic impact of more than \$800,000 with visitors coming from 84 Texas counties and 14 other states to take in all the entertainment, food and fun.

DBA organizers say some of the changes include reducing the number of music stages from five to four to allow visitors time to watch the acts perform. The festival will start on Sunday at noon instead of 10 am, and the number of wineries will be limited.

DBA executive director Sandy Farris says, "Texas Reds is continuing to create a positive feeling for Bryan-College Station. What we hope for is to spill over into other parts of town. They come and see something they like here, they will come back another time of the year and that's our goal."

Also, something new this year, the DBA will award two \$500 scholarships to two Bryan ISD students in May.

But it wasn't until she helped her father evacute for Hurricane Ike that the story for her book came to life. "They say write about something you know, and after that the story fell into place."


