The annual Bryan City Cemetery Clean-Up Day was attended by approximately 70 volunteers, making it one of the best turnouts in recent years! The Bryan Animal Center's Pawpaloosa event at Buzz Hamilton Dog Park was a great success, leading to 3 adoptions and great exposure of our animal center to the community. During the month of July we celebrated Park and Recreation Month with Tuesday Movies in the Park at Tanglewood Park, Villa West Park, and Henderson Harbor Pool.

Family-friendly movies were featured with free admission at both parks and the regular entry fee at the pool.

The City of Bryan Parks and Recreation Department is also providing a number of classes for all ages this summer including karate, swimming, softball, basketball, and golf. As a reminder, City of Bryan employees have free access to city pools as well as Lake Bryan, and reduced fees for classes.



Finally, the City Council approved the construction of a new aquatic facility in Sadie Thomas Park to replace the pool that was closed in 2008. Public opinion is being collected, after which time the design and construction process can begin. The City Council and staff look forward to the completion of the project in 2016.

Rudder HS students donate obstacle course to Bryan Police K9 unit

Rudder High School welding students donated an obstacle course to the Bryan Police Department's K9 unit last month.

The welding students in Mr. White's class at Rudder High built the course as part of their spring project. Sergeant Chad Hanks and Officer Al Hauke repaid the students with pizza during their finals.

"It means a lot - the support of the program, the support of the department - which ultimately is going to help them - help the citizens in the long run, help their families at home," said Sgt. Hanks. "This was a huge benefit, and especially the quality of how it was built. This thing will be here long after I retire. You know, I'm not a welder, but it's very professionally made."

Police say between labor and parts, the gift saved taxpayers several thousand dollars that the department would have spent to hire someone else to build the course.

"We can put the dogs through it -- let them expend some energy and get some training value out of it as well -- and that's daily that we can get out of the course. We don't want the little obstacles that the K9 team may encounter on the way to the objective to interfere with them so that way they can go through the windows, go over walls and stuff like that with no problem," said Sgt. Hanks.

It also saves time.

The K9 team usually trains at Lake Bryan, for eight hours, once a week. With the new course, they say they can train more often. Police and dogs train together for about five months before they go out into the field.

"So that way when it happens on the streets, they'll flawlessly execute -- or should flawlessly execute -- whatever they're supposed to do. You know, find lost drugs, find some evidence that we need to locate. They're a lot of fun to watch," said Sgt. Hanks. "It helps us a lot to continue this program without any extra burden on the budget and taxpayers and stuff like that. The community coming out and supporting us -- so it definitely means a lot to us."

The department says there are still a few pieces of the course left to finish. They say they will have two more dogs by this October, pending city council approval.

City of Bryan municipal judge retires after 12 years

State of the City Report Wins Top Honors in Texas

Bryan's first ever video State of the City Report won the first place TAMI award from the Texas Association of Municipal Information Officers (TAMIO) in the category of Best Electronic Report in the State of Texas.

"It's an honor to be recognized by TAMIO for the State of the City Report," said Bryan Mayor Jason Bienski. "The City of Bryan has a lot to be proud of and our

communications team has done an excellent job of highlighting and promoting the city. We know everything is better in Bryan, and now the rest of the State does too."

In addition to the first place TAMI Award, the team won the Award of Excellence in the category of Best Promotional Item for the use of the "I Am Bryan" sign in its "Bigger in Texas - Better in Bryan" campaign. The Communications and Marketing team has been photographing community members holding this sign in a variety of settings as a companion to the State of the City report.

Bryan's communication team also won

three Awards of Honor for the Culinary Classes Video, Culinary Classes Poster, and Best Media Relations Program.

The TAMIO Awards are the leading recognition program in Texas honoring excellence for municipal communication strategies. Awards were presented in 24 different marketing, print, video, special events, and technological service categories. The City of Bryan took home a total of five awards, a record for the City of Bryan.

Bryan Water Quality Report Debuts Water Conservation Game

For the first time in 10 years, the City of Bryan's state-required water quality report was released in a new format. Instead of the calendar-style report, the City released an educational board game called "Let It Flow".

Water quality reports are distributed to all municipal water customers, under the Consumer Confidence Report rule. The City of Bryan Water Services Department sets out each year to creatively present the material to all water customers to encourage residents to read the report.

"Let It Flow" combines water conservation tips with a family-friendly board game that is suitable for all ages.

"We hope that residents will find the game interactive and engaging," said Jayson Barfknecht, City

of Bryan Public Works Director. "It's a great way to bring fun and education into the home to learn about saving our resources, while

meeting the state law requirements to provide an annual water quality report. If children become water conservationists now, their lifelong habits will have a lasting impact on our future water supply."


Students from the Bryan High School game club and the Rudder

Using Mediation Techniques to Manage Drama in the Workplace: Consider All the Angles – Employees and Managers

Dysfunctional workplaces occur when conflict gets out of hand. Many of us prefer to avoid it completely, or compromise when we truly do not want to just to keep the peace – but sometimes that leads to anger and resentment, and even more tension. Come learn tips, tools and techniques for the best ways to handle drama and conflict, and reach respectful resolution, from an expert mediator who has resolved over 1000 workplace conflicts.

> 8 Tricks to Help You Stay on Task at Work:

1. **Change your environment.** Create a kind of cocoon by stacking books or moving files to make yourself less accessible, when appropriate.

2. **Be honest with yourself**. Accepting that distractions are out there is half the battle in keeping them at bay when your mind is tempted to stray.

3. **Make a plan**. Preparing a list of what you need to get done or setting a timer can help you focus.

4. **Take a walk**. When you do need a break, don't hop online hop out of your chair and get some fresh air. Doing so provides a different kind of brain stimulation that can leave you refreshed.

5. Let others know when you're buckling down. Put a sign on your workspace saying "on task" or "on deadline" when appropriate. Talk to your supervisor and team about everyone adopting the practice.

6. **Send it to email**. "Can you email me that?" is a good way to get someone to stop talking to you while you're focused on working.

7. **Hold your line**. If people ignore your sign or keep talking, defend the boundary you've set. Acknowledge that what they're saying is important and explain you want to give it your full attention when you're able to do so.

8. **Bring it up off deadline**. Set up check-in times so you can communicate when it works for you.
