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

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Introduction

This Preservation Plan serves as an update to the previously-approved Historic Preservation Plan for Bryan, Texas, completed in 1989 by Tom Niederauer & Associates, and works to supplement the City of Bryan Comprehensive Plan as well as federal, state, and local programs. Using the existing Preservation Plan as a guide, this update removes completed goals and objectives, as well as maintains goals and strategies, which are still relevant today.

Preservation Plans provide an opportunity for cities to lay the framework for preserving, protecting, and leveraging their historic and cultural fabrics for the betterment of all. At its most basic definition, historic preservation is the process of creating and implementing a strategy to protect and enhance historic resources. These resources include sites, structures, objects, stories, and districts that have national, state, or local historical or cultural significance.

The City of Bryan is a unique place identified by its embrace of various cultures, distinctly intact historic downtown, and welcoming attitude. Using continued momentum gained from the implementation of the award winning Downtown Master Plan, adopted in September 2001 by the Bryan City Council, this preservation plan update will allow for Bryan citizens to be more engaged in preserving their own history and cultures and reap the benefits of a thriving heritage tourism industry.



Purpose and Objectives

The National Park Service (NPS) defines preservation planning as the "rational, systematic process by which a community develops a vision, goals, and priorities for the preservation of its historic and cultural resources." NPS further identifies the four goals, shown below, for historic preservation planning programs:

- "Strengthen the integration of historic preservation into the broader public policy and land-use planning and decision-making arenas at the federal, state, tribal, and local levels";
- "Increase the opportunities for broad-based and diverse public participation in planning for historic and cultural resources";
- "Expand knowledge and skills in historic preservation planning"; and
- "Assist states, tribes, local governments, and federal agencies in carrying out inclusive preservation planning programs that are responsive to their own needs and concerns."

The intent of this 2023 Historic Preservation Plan is to:

- 1. Cultivate a "preservation ethic" in the community through an active outreach program.
- 2. Act as historic preservation advocates for/to all Departments, Boards, and Commissions of the City of Bryan, and provide leadership in integrating those municipal programs that impact preservation.
- 3. Record and promote the history of the people and the development of Bryan.
- 4. Preserve and enhance all historic structures in Bryan through an active designation program.
- 5. Provide preservation services to the community through guidelines, seminars, and review processes.
- 6. Promote historic preservation as a catalyst for economic development.



Preservation in Bryan


A strong historic preservation enabling ordinance, written by local citizens was adopted in 1981. As a result of the enacted historic preservation ordinance, the Bryan Historic Landmark Commission was formed. This seven (7) person commission, appointed by the City Council, are charged with the protection and enhancement of Bryan's historic resources. They recommend to the City Council and Planning and Zoning Commission those sites, structures, and objects that should be designated as local landmarks.

Since 1981, the Bryan Historic Landmark Commission and the City of Bryan have been able to accomplish several important goals:


- In 1986 a comprehensive survey was conducted to identify the city's historic resources. The results of this survey can be viewed in Appendix B. Of the 613 properties surveyed, 120 now have a recognized historical designation being listed on the National Register of Historic Places and/or are within a local historic district.
- Six (6) historic districts have been established—Eastside Historic District, Downtown Historic District, and four (4) Landmark Historic Districts (Milton Parker House, International Harvester Building, Girl Scout Little House, and Vilas Motor Works).
- The Historic Landmark Commission and the City of Bryan have worked together with several downtown organizations to bring festivals, events, and more attention to Downtown Bryan.

Through the continued efforts of the Historic Landmark Commission, the City of Bryan envisions enhanced historic preservation endeavors and public participation in the future.








Community Outreach and Engagement

To provide information and encourage community participation, an active plan of engagement was employed. Critical to success was a new website, broadcast and print information releases, social media posts, radio and television guest appearances and direct community engagement. Gathering community perspectives regarding a wide spectrum of preservation topics is important to the initial and ongoing success of the plan. As conditions and circumstances change subsequent to the adoption of the plan, regular status updates will provide guidance for future plan amendments. It is intended that this plan serve as a living document.

It is acknowledged that the above mentioned activities were not able to reach all segments of Bryan's culturally diverse community. An important feature of this plan is to cultivate a "preservation ethic" in the community through an active and continual outreach program. To accomplish this, local preservation advocates will be supported and encouraged to engage neighborhood leaders and other trusted voices in the community, identifying and explaining the benefits of historic preservation.

Two in-person, direct-to-the-public community outreach events were held during the First Friday events in May and June. On the first Friday of each month, the streets of Historic Downtown Bryan transform into the site of a lively gathering and becomes the heart of the community. Along with our preservation partners, the staff of the Carnegie History Center, the First Friday community outreach efforts were located prominently in front of Bryan's 1903 Carnegie Library. In addition to providing information regarding the Preservation Plan update, citizens were invited to directly contribute to Bryan's cultural fabric by sharing their untold stories.

City of Bryan's HISTORIC PRESERVATION PLAN

Vision, Goals, and Strategies

Upon the adoption of the Historic Preservation Overlay District Ordinance, the City Council declared that "the preservation, protection, enhancement, and perpetuation of properties of historic and cultural importance and significance are necessary to promote the economic, cultural, educational, and general welfare of the public."

A decades long process, the preservation efforts in Bryan have, in many ways, served as the catalyst for the rebirth of Downtown. This progress along with the pride and stability demonstrated in the Eastside Historic District, and various other historic districts, highlights the dedication and resolution of citizens and elected and appointed officials to preserve their historic resources. The Vision, Goals, and Strategies described on the following pages are designed to provide guidance and direction to build upon past successes as well as enhance future preservation efforts.

Implementation is just as vital to the success of a preservation plan as are the plan's vision, goals, and strategies. For each strategy there are a set of action items and responsible organizations providing direction for current and future generations to use in directing and achieving the goals and strategies.

It is the mission of the Historic Landmark Commission to: Communicate, Advocate, Regulate, and Educate (CARE).



GOAL 1

CULTIVATE A "PRESERVATION ETHIC" IN THE COMMUNITY THROUGH AN ACTIVE OUTREACH PROGRAM



Strategy 1:

Encourage local advocates to speak to the benefits of historic preservation

Historic preservation takes a village and encouraging local advocates to speak to the benefits of historic preservation will lend credence to its necessity and provide ownership of preservation activities. ACTION ITEMS


- 1. Identify and contact potential community advocates.

Strategy 2:

Establishing a user-friendly, easy to navigate web presence providing information in one place will help encourage community involvement and interest in historic preservation.

- 2. Foster two-way communication through online feedback.
- 3. Promote/advertise available online resources.

Strategy 3:

Collaborate with local organizations to create and sustain active preservation activities

Working with organizations who specialize in heritage tourism will bring an added level of expertise and professional experience on how Bryan can create and sustain active preservation programs and activities. These preservation programs and activities will provide visitors to Bryan with an authentic experience and will keep them coming back to visit again.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Support local preservation organizations by active participation, training opportunities, information sharing, and funding.
- 2. Utilize specifically targeted funding (i.e. Hotel Occupancy Taxes) to sponsor:
 - ♦ Historical restoration and preservation projects.
 - Advertising and conduct promotional programs to encourage tourists to visit preserved historic sites or museums.
- 3. Collaborate with local schools to host history fairs and similar activities.

Strategy 1:

Host annual joint meetings between various boards and commissions to engage elected and appointed officials and discuss action items of the Historic Landmark Commission

Open dialogue between the public and elected and appointed officials, is vital to the success of the preservation plan. Through annual joint meetings the Historic Landmark Commission will be able to effectively communicate not only their mission and plan of action for the year, but keep historic preservation at the forefront.

ACTION ITEMS


- 1. Annually update Historic Landmark Commission action items and plan of work and report to City Council.

Strategy 2:

Support individual commissioner's participation as speakers on preservation-related topics to local organizations

Historic Landmark Commission members are in the best position to serve as advocates for historic preservation in their roles as City Council appointees and citizens of Bryan. Training to speak with "one voice" through consistent communication will solidify the commission's messaging and assist in all commissioners being able to speak on preservation-related topics to local organizations.

- 1. Develop training curriculum.
- 2. Train Historic Landmark Commissioners to communicate consistent messaging.
- 3. Publicize availability of staff and Historic Landmark Commissioners to local organizations.

Strategy 3:

To maintain a functional preservation plan, continued adjustments responding to changing conditions and opportunities is essential. By establishing a regularly occurring agenda item for Historic Landmark Commission meetings to discuss the status of the preservation plan and annually review possible amendments, the preservation plan becomes a living document and eases the review processes for later generations of preservationists.

- 1. Identify changing conditions and opportunities.
- 2. Maintain monthly records of potential items to update.
- 3. Establish regularly occurring Historic Landmark Commission meeting agenda item.
- 4. Report findings to the City Council, as needed.

Strategy 1:

Integrate existing resources together with this plan to provide a centralized, easily accessible, information repository

Building upon resource gathering completed by the Carnegie Library staff, the City of Bryan's 150th anniversary of official incorporation in 2021, and other local preservation organizations, we can integrate these existing resources into a centralized and easily accessible information repository eliminating the need to reinvent the wheel. This will also help to bring existing information and possible new discoveries to light by individuals who may not feel comfortable engaging in a public setting.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Through Bryan City Council action, appoint the Carnegie History Center Branch Manager or his or her designee, as an ex-officio member of the Historic Landmark Commission.
- 2. Establish an easily accessible resources bookshelf, linked to the Historic Preservation website.
- 3. Create and keep current a Historic Preservation website linking available historical resources.

Strategy 2:

Fund continued collection of oral and written stories

The importance of collecting oral and written stories is to gain insight into our past by sharing various experiences and perspectives from different cultures. These stories provide authentic, eye witness accounts of the past to future generations, sometimes confirming the written record, but at other times challenging what had been established as the norm by those in the majority.

During the City of Bryan's 150th anniversary of official incorporation in 2021, substantial work was undertaken to establish a framework for collecting and sharing oral and written stories throughout the community. The establishment of a permanent funding source for the continued collection of these undertold stories is vital to preserving not only our community's past but our cultural past.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Establish an accessible and centralized database for all oral and written stories.
- 2. Continue to open communication channels throughout historically underrepresented groups and invite them to share their stories through various means.
- 3. Proactively engage the community with mobile oral and written story booths.

Strategy 3:

Recognize and identify historically underrepresented groups

The City of Bryan has been and continues to be a culturally rich and diverse community and through gentrification, natural disasters, urban renewal, and others means, historically underrepresented groups have quickly found their past being erased from history with older generations no longer able to pass along cultural stories or anecdotes. These groups may lack resources or support to preserve their cultures in today's societies.

Identifying and recognizing historically underrepresented groups, then engaging those communities through events and open dialogue, will help ensure open communication between preservation organizations and increase the community's knowledge of these vital resources.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Sponsor bi-annual information gathering events throughout the community.
- 2. As opportunities arise, on-demand receipt of information.
- 3. Streamline process by which historical materials are received.
- 4. Increase capacity to archive and conserve qualifying materials.

GOAL 4

TO PRESERVE AND ENHANCE ALL HISTORIC STRUCTURES IN BRYAN THROUGH AN ACTIVE DESIGNATION PROGRAM



Strategy 1:

Complete a comprehensive update of the Historic Resources Survey

Historic structures help provide people with a sense of place, a connection to the past, and build community pride through their architecture, form, and aesthetics. This bridge to a place's past tells the story of how and why a place was created. Identifying existing structures, which may qualify for historic designation, will help ensure that our past is preserved and also benefit a place by providing another economic boost through heritage tourism.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Adequately train staff on significance of resources not in current survey.
- 2. Continually apply for grants to obtain survey resources, and to maintain the existing resource database.
- 3. Provide public outreach for property owners who will be impacted by conducting a survey.

Strategy 2:

Promote and maintain the Bryan Landmark Marker program through various channels of communication

The Bryan Landmark Marker program is a project of the City of Bryan Historic Landmark Commission. The Commission, a seven-member citizen committee appointed by the Bryan City Council, created this program to recognize and preserve the history of Bryan's many historic landmarks as well as instill a sense of community pride among Bryan's residents.

As part of this program, applicants are asked to submit a completed application to the City of Bryan Development Services Department. A complete application consists of the following: signed application, application fee, photographs of historic and existing conditions (as available) and a narrative history (to the extent known). The purpose of these requirements is not intended to be burdensome, but to identify and preserve as a much information as possible about the history of our city for future generations.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Provide easily accessible information through a dedicated historic preservation website.
- 2. Promote the program through organizations which align with preservation efforts in Bryan, and other various channels of communication.
- 3. Continue to provide mailers with detailed information to properties which may qualify.

Strategy 3:

Provide guidance for citizens who seek further historic designation

There currently exists multiple local historic districts in Bryan, and historical designation on eligible properties provides many benefits to not only the property owner, but to the city as a whole. There are a wide range of benefits for seeking historical designation, these include:

- Accessibility to federal, state, and local grants
- Tax incentives
- Available assistance with preservation through the National Park Service
- Possible eligibility for various marker programs

The lack of education, training, and resources has historically limited people's willingness and ability to apply for historic designation(s). This strategy works to remedy these impediments and provide a clear path for preservation.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Include guidance information in various formats including but not limited to highly distributed print media.
- 2. Engage community through outreach events located throughout the city.



Attending annual training opportunities we will not only grow as an organization but as community advocates for historic preservation.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Adopt annual training curriculum for staff and the Historic Landmark Commission.
- 2. Seek unique training opportunities which challenge and encourage critical thinking.
- 3. Utilize current local preservation projects as resources for training.

By providing public seminars and workshops highlighting the best practices in historic preservation, we educate not only our community but our development community with alternatives that may not have been thought possible before by saving existing structures.

- 1. Annually identify public seminar and/or workshop opportunities.
- 2. Advertise these events through various media outlets.
- 3. Record the event for later viewing online.



GOAL 6

Strategy 1:

Collaborate with preservation partners and organizations to promote heritage tourism

Strategy 2:

Continue funding the Downtown Improvements Program grant

The goal of the Downtown Improvements Programs (DIP) grant is to provide funds used to improve the building facades located in the eligible area of Downtown Bryan. This program benefits the City of Bryan by making Downtown buildings more physically attractive, increasing the economic vitality of the buildings, increasing sales tax and property values, while preserving and enhancing Bryan's architectural and cultural history.

Continued funding of this program will extend the success of Downtown Bryan and ensure that those structures within the eligible area are preserved.

ACTION ITEMS


- 1. Continue to provide the Downtown Improvement Program grant with a funding source.

Strategy 3:
